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Foreword

This multi-media bibliography is a selected listing of recent materials evaluated by Saskatchewan educators and considered appropriate for support of the Grade 9 Social Studies Program, *Roots of Society*.

It is the responsibility of the school to preview and select materials to meet the needs of each particular school and community. Teachers and teacher-librarians are advised to refer to their school board's selection policy for guidance in making choices about materials. The Saskatchewan Education publication, Learning Resource Centres in Saskatchewan: A Guide for Development, provides valuable direction for development of a selection policy.

As outlined in Saskatchewan Education's *Indian and Métis Education Policy from Kindergarten to Grade XII*, teachers and teacher-librarians are reminded to select works by and about Indian and Métis peoples.

Books, filmstrips, and other small format materials are not available for loan from Saskatchewan Education. Schools interested in purchasing these resources should contact the distributor (in some cases, the Book Bureau) cited in the Publisher/Producer/Distributor Directory that follows the bibliography. Please refer to the section on "How to Use the Bibliography" for information to assist in efficient use of this document. Prices quoted are subject to change, but will serve as a guide to approximate costs. Book Bureau prices include shipping and handling fees, but in most other cases there will be an additional charge for shipping and handling.

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Textbooks

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A textbook entitled *Exploring Our Roots* is being developed to support *Roots of Society*. Upon completion, it will be available for purchase from the Book Bureau.

When considering the purchase of materials, schools should keep in mind that textbooks represent only one form of support material. Saskatchewan Education is promoting a philosophy of resource-based learning that encourages teachers to move away from a single textbook approach. To become well educated in this ever-changing "information age," students must be given opportunities to interact with a wide range of current media including kits, video, charts, software and various print forms in addition to textbooks.

It is hoped that this bibliography will prove to be useful in assisting educators to choose a variety of appropriate materials that will meet the specific needs of their communities.

How to Use the Bibliography

The bibliography is organized in five sections:

I. Titles and Description: Titles are listed alphabetically. The citations provide bibliographic information, sources, annotations, and suggested units of study that the material would appropriately support. The abbreviation hdc. denotes hardcover edition, while pbk. denotes paperback edition. ISBN is an abbreviation for International Standard Book Number, which can usually be used as an order number. An example of a citation for print is:



The Adventure of Archaeology (Print-Non-Fiction). Brian M. Fagan. National Geographic Society (NGS), 1985. 368 p. ISBN 0-87044-814-7 (\$32.95 hdc.)

Tracing the events through which archaeology developed from an interest in collecting antiquities to a sophisticated science, the author explains that archaeologists not only search for artifacts, but for explanations of their significance. Excellent on-site and museum photographs. Provides a glossary and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

The Age of Chivalry (Print-Non-Fiction). Haydn Middleton. (Presenting the Past Topics Series). Oxford University Press (OUP), 1988. 31 p. ISBN 0-19-913346-8 (\$8.75 hdc.)

Describes knighthood and chivalry from beginning to decline, including apprenticeship, crusading and heraldry. Discusses Christianity and killing for Christ. Provides a chapter on legends, ladies and lovers. Contains thought provoking questions. Offers beautiful colour illustrations. Includes a table of contents and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Change

The Age of Europe (Print-Non-Fiction). Ira Peck and Elise Bauman. Scholastic Inc. (SCH), 1976, 1987. 255 p. Text - ISBN 0-590-34737-3 (\$29.95 pbk.). Teacher's resource manual - ISBN 0-590-34738-1 (\$10.95 pbk.)

Offers a history of Europe from the fall of Rome to Napoleon. This text is divided into seven parts: "The Medieval World," "The Rise of Nations," "The Renaissance," "The Reformation," "The Age of Discovery," "The Age of Change" and "The Age of Revolution." Subjects covered include cultural and political achievements during the Middle Ages, the growth of commerce, the flourishing of the arts and sciences, the role of religion in shaping society, the expansion of the known world through exploration, and the emergence of the rights of individuals. Provides many black and white, and colour visuals, but some are blurred. Includes questions at the end of each chapter, a table of contents, a glossary and an index. The teacher's resource manual provides suggestions for introductory and follow-up activites including debates, role-playing, discussions, and map and timeline activites.

The Agricultural Revolution (16 mm Film). Network Television Production (MHP), 1983. 23 min. Available for loan, Order No. 8598

Demonstrates that all civilizations are dependent upon agriculture, depicts the origins of agriculture, and

describes its development to the present. Examines the origins of cereal crops, dates, olives, potatoes, etc., and their distribution. Shows Jericho, Catal Kuyuk, and some ancient methods of regulating water supply.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

The Agricultural Revolution (8000 - 5000 B.C.) (Videotape). Goldcrest Films and Video (MHP), 1985. 25 min. Available for duplication, Order No. V02783

Details the gradual transformation of humans from hunters to farmers. Emphasizes the importance of this development in world history and the concept that the growth in agriculture allowed for spectacular growth in human population and the evolution of complex societies.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Alternative Religions Series (Print-Non-Fiction). Please refer to the title *The Hutterites: Christians who Practise a Communal Way of Life*.

Ancient Civilizations (Filmstrip Kit). National Geographical Society (NGS), 1978. Includes 5 filmstrips, 5 audiocassettes, app. 15 min. each, and 5 teacher's guides. Order No. 03972 (\$143.85 kit)

Contents:

Mesopotamia and Egypt - Traces the development and major accomplishments of the two civilizations and introduces important historical figures.

China - Examines major periods and events in the development of China's civilization, identifies surviving customs and traditions and illustrates aspects of ancient Chinese art, technology and government.

Greece - Discusses major historical events and people and describes elements of modern civilization that originated in Greece.

Rome - Traces the development of the Roman Empire, illustrates aspects of everyday life and describes important achievements of Roman civilization.

Africa - Describes several early African civilizations, examines African peoples' accomplishments, and why few visible traces of ancient Africa have survived.

Ancient Egypt. Rev. ed. (16 mm Film). Coronet Film & Video (MHP), 1977. 11 min. Available for loan, Order No. 7635

The Nile was important in determining lifestyles and shaping attitudes of ancient Egyptians. A look at art and architecture and the artifacts from tombs, including that of King Tutankhamen. Provides a key to ancient Egyptian views on life and death.

Ancient Egypt (Wall Chart). Joanne O'Brien. Pictorial Charts Educational Trust (CEM), n.d. 1 poster 75 cm by 100 cm. Order No. E53 (\$11.95 chart)

A poster with 10 photographs of relics and temples of ancient Egypt and one map of the Nile area. Each photo is accompanied by explanatory text.

Ancient Egyptian Ships (Wall Chart). N.B. Millet. Royal Ontario Museum (UTP), 1982. 1 wall chart, 78 cm by 22 cm. ISBN 88854-3743 (\$7.50 chart)

Provides coloured illustrations of ships used in ancient Egypt. Each ship is numbered and accompanied by text giving technological information and cultural background.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

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Ancient Greece. Rev. ed. (16 mm Film). Coronet Instructional Films (MHP), 1976. 10 min. Available for loan, Order No. 7638.

The Parthenon, The Academia, the Plain of Marathon, Delphi and the Athenian countryside reflect the spirit of ancient Greece. Today, there are many reminders of ancient Greek culture's lasting influence on western civilization.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Ancient Monuments and Mysteries (Filmstrip Kit). National Geographic Society (NGS), 1978. Includes 1 colour filmstrip and 1 audiocassette, app. 15 min., with teacher's guide. Order No. 03995 (\$41.95 kit)

The kit could be used to motivate students to question why and how past civilizations created their monuments.

Ancient Rome (Print-Non-Fiction). Mike Corbishley. (A Cultural Atlas for Young People). Facts on File (CMG), 1989. 96 p. ISBN 0-8160-1970-3 (\$22.95 hdc.)

Each double page spread features a separate topic, with coloured maps and pictures accompanied by text. These short sections together give an overview of ancient Rome, aspects of Roman life, and the spread of its civilization. Includes a table of contents, glossary, gazetteer and index.

Ancient Rome. Rev. ed. (16 mm Film). Coronet Instructional Films (MHP), 1977. 11 min. Available for loan, Order No. 7637

Ancient Rome was a magnificent city of imposing buildings, but it was also a crowded slum plagued by

crime, pollution and poverty. This survey of a multifaceted Rome offers new insight into the past and acknowledges our inheritance from it.

Anne Langton and Pioneering in Upper Canada (Print-Non-Fiction). L. Doris Baker. (We Built Canada Series). Irwin Publishing (IRW), 1985. 92 p. ISBN 0-7725-1548-4 (\$9.35 pbk.)

Anne's journey from England to Upper Canada in 1837 and her subsequent life in the backwoods is described and enhanced with passages from her diary and her sketches. Includes a table of contents.

Annual Editions Series (Print-Non-Fiction). Please refer to the title Western Civilization, Vol. I: Prehistory Through the Reformation.

Apihtowkosan: The Story of the Métis Nation in Western Canada (Print-Non-Fiction). John and Betty Dorion. Northern Lights School Division #113 (NLSD), 1982. Includes 70 p. student activity book and 70 p. teacher's guide. No ISBN (\$31.00 set, spiral bound)

A teacher's guide and student activity book deal with the origin, history and culture of Métis people, from the Métis perspective. Designed to accompany the Grade 8 Social Studies Curriculum, this book is also useful for grade 9. Includes a table of contents.

Suggested Unit(s): Technology

Archaeology (Print-Non-Fiction). Alison Taurel (translator). (Science and Its Secrets Series). Raintree Publishers (NEL), 1988. 64 p. ISBN 0-8172-3077-7 (\$19.50 hdc.). ISBN 0-8172-3094-7 (\$15.50 pbk.)

Discusses great sites and lost civilizations. Answers commonly asked questions about archaeologists and their work, such as, Who gets the objects that are found? and, How are objects dated? Provides a chapter on life in ancient times. Offers many beautiful visuals, both colour and black and white. Includes a table of contents, glossary and index.

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Suggested Unit(s): Time

Archeological Dating: Retracing Time (16 mm Film). Encyclopaedia Britannica Publications Ltd. (MHP), 1976. 18 min. Available for loan, Order No. 6400

Explores relative and absolute dating techniques used by archaeologists to date their finds including tree rings on a roof beam, shifts in the position of the magnetic north pole recorded in the clay of ancient hearths, radioactivity, and multi-layered sites.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Art and Environment (Videotape). (Canadian Inuit Sculpture Series). Canadian Broadcasting Corp. (MHP), 1977. 14 min. Available for duplication, Order No. V01062

Provides a brief historical overview of the Arctic in order to lay the foundation for a better understanding of the people who have lived in the barren lands for thousands of years. As the development of culture in the Arctic is traced, one realizes that art forms are closely related to the environment in which the artist lives. The advent of Euro-Canadians on the Arctic scene affects both the environment and the art of the Inuit.

Suggested Unit(s): Culture

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The Art of the Nehiyawak (Print-Non-Fiction). Ken J. Hodgins. Plains Publishing (BB), 1988. 112 p. Order No. BB 6181 (\$29.95 hdc.)

Gives insight into people, culture, and traditions of the Woods Cree from the northern forests of Ontario to Alberta. An Elder acts as a guide telling legends and facts about traditional ways and their incorporation into modern life. Profiles 27 Cree artists. Includes coloured photographs, reproductions, and drawings of art and craft work of the Plains Cree. Also provides games and recipes. Provides a table of contents.

Suggested Unit(s): Culture

The Ascent of Man. Rev. ed. (16 mm Film). (The Science of Life Series). Biofilms (MHP), 1981. 23 min. Available for loan, Order No. 8588

Traces the evolution of mammals and presents a survey of the history of human species development. Raises the question of whether man as a species is capable of assuming total responsibility for his future. Appropriate to use when presenting the theory of evolution.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Asian Civilizations (Print-Non-Fiction). Jean-Michel Coblence. (The Human Story Series). Silver Burdett (GIN), 1988. 77 p. ISBN 0-382-09483-2 (\$19.95 hdc.)

Contains overviews of the histories of the major early Asian civilizations, beginning with general prehistory, then focusing on China, Japan, India, and Indo-China. The final section deals with specific details about Asian history. Includes a table of contents and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Aspects of Roman Life Series (Print-Non-Fiction). Please refer to the title Roman Technology and Crafts.

Atlas of Ancient America (Print-Non-Fiction). Michael Coe, et al. Facts on File (FOF), 1986. 240 p. ISBN 0-8160-1199-0 (\$55.00 hdc.)

Although the writing style is complicated for the average grade 9 student, the colour illustrations and detailed content make this a good resource book for teachers and, with some guidance, for students. Examines ancient American peoples and their societies. Topics range from geography and Ice Age

migrations to major cultures and the inheritance of ancient ways by modern cultures. Includes a table of contents, chronological table, glossary, gazetteer and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Atlas of Ancient Egypt (Print-Non-Fiction). John Baines and Jaromir Malek. Facts on File (FOF), 1980. 240 p. ISBN 0-87196-334-5 (\$55.00 hdc.)

Although the writing style is complicated for the average grade 9 student, the colour illustrations and detailed content make this a good resource book for teachers and, with some guidance, for students. Describes ancient Egyptian civilization, providing a systematic survey of important Egyptian monuments, describing them and assessing their historical and cultural importance. Includes a table of contents, chronological table, glossary, gazetteer and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Atlas of Medieval Europe (Print-Non-Fiction). Donald Matthew. Facts on File (FOF), 1983. 240 p. ISBN 0-87196-133-4 (\$55.00 hdc.)

Although the writing style is complicated for the average grade 9 student, the colour illustrations and detailed content make this a good resource book for teachers and, with some guidance, for students. Surveys the history of European culture and society from the decline of the Roman Empire to the discovery of America in the late fifteenth century. Includes a table of contents, chronological table, gazetteer and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Change

Atlas of the Greek World (Print-Non-Fiction). Peter Levi. Facts on File (FOF), 1984. 239 p. ISBN 0-87196-448-1 (\$55.00 hdc.)

Although the writing style is complicated for the average grade 9 student, the colour illustrations and detailed content make this a good resource book for teachers and, with some guidance, for students. Describes Greek civilization from Minoan times to the arrival of the Romans. Includes a table of contents, chronological table, glossary, gazetteer and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Atlas of the Roman World (Print-Non-Fiction). Tim Cornell and John Mathews. Facts on File (FOF), 1982. 240 p. ISBN 0-87196-652-2 (\$55.00 hdc.)

Although the writing style is complicated for the average grade 9 student, the colour illustrations and detailed content make this a good resource book for teachers and, with some guidance, for students. Describes the Roman Empire from its beginnings to its fall. Includes table of contents, glossary, gazetteer and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Time

Atlas of World History. Rev. ed. (Print-Non-Fiction). Rand McNally (ALL), 1981, revised 1987. 191 p. ISBN 0-5283-410-X (\$26.95 pbk.)

Provides maps and text which examine the beginnings of civilization to the emergence of the modern world. Contains a final section of United States historical maps.

Suggested Unit(s): All

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Attention: Women at Work (Videotape). National Film Board of Canada (MHP), 1983. 29 min. Available for duplication, Order No. V02782

A group of teenage girls discuss career choices and the influences of our society on these choices. Women in non-traditional careers are profiled and interviewed.

Suggested Unit(s): Technology

The Aztecs (Print-Non-Fiction). Frances F. Berdan. (Indians of North America Series). Chelsea House (NEL), 1989. 112 p. ISBN 1-55546-692-3 (\$24.95 hdc.). ISBN 0-7910-0354-X (\$16.95 pbk.)

Describes the way of life and beliefs of the ancient Aztecs of Mexico and the effects of the Spanish conquest. Provides many visuals, both colour and black and white. Includes a table of contents, glossary and index.

Banduras in the Mosaic (Videotape). (Ukrainian Culture and Traditions Series). SaskMedia (MHP), 1978. 10 min. Available for duplication, Order No. V00631

This is an overview of who Ukrainians are, where they came from, their historical contributions to Canada, and some of the traditions that they brought with them. May also be used in Grade 8 Social Studies.

Suggested Unit(s): Technology

The Bead Game (Videotape). National Film Board of Canada (MHP), 1977. 5:35 min. Available for duplication, Order No. V02899

An innovative form of animation without words. Thousands of beads are arranged and manipulated to assume various shapes. Examines the evolution of living organisms focusing on the "survival of the fittest" aspect, then looks at the evolution of arms and ends with the message that people are in control of their own destiny.

Provides over 60 visuals including historical and modern photographs, illustrations, charts, graphs and maps. Offers four case studies. Includes a table of contents, glossary and index.

Using colour illustrations and elementary level text, this book gives a brief description of the development and results of the bubonic plague of fourteenth century Europe. Includes a table of contents, glossary and index.

The Black Death (Print-Non-Fiction). Derek Turner. (Then and There Series). Longman (CCP), 1988. 56 p. ISBN 0-582-31097-0 (\$5.95 pbk.)

Using quotes and anecdotes, this booklet describes the impact the bubonic plague (1347-1350) had on the European population. Since smaller outbreaks lasted until the seventeenth century, anecdotes from after the fourteenth century are also used. Includes a table of contents, glossary and index.

Suggested Unit(s): Change

The Book of Canadians: An Illustrated Guide to Who Did What (Print-Non-Fiction). Carlotta Hacker. Hurtig (HUR), 1983. 240 p. ISBN 0-88830-243-6 (\$19.95 hdc.)

Provides short write-ups and black and white photographs of prominent Canadians, modern and historical, in alphabetical order. Includes an index.

Suggested Unit(s): Technology

Books for World Explorers Series (Print-Non-Fiction). Please refer to the title *Hidden Treasures of the Sea*.

Breaking Through: A Canadian Literary Mosaic (Print-Fiction and Non-Fiction). John Borovilos. Prentice-Hall (BB), 1990. 318 p. Order No. BB 6183 (\$18.00 pbk.)

An anthology of short stories, poems and essays by and about the various peoples who make up the Canadian cultural mosaic. Intended for secondary level students, but could be useful at the middle level with guidance. Includes a "Student Handbook" at the back with information and questions about each selection. Provides a table of contents, a theme index and an author index.

Suggested Unit(s): Technology
