

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

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Foreword

This multi-media bibliography is an annotated list of selected materials evaluated by Saskatchewan educators and considered appropriate for support of the Grade 1 to Grade 5 Arts Education curriculum.

Teachers are advised that, although resources in this bibliography have been identified as suitable for the grades 1-5 level, materials selection remains a local responsibility. Throughout the bibliography, annotations make reference to issues which may be considered controversial. It remains the responsibility of the school to preview and select materials to ensure that the needs of that particular school are met. Teachers and teacher-librarians are advised to refer to their school board's selection policy for guidance in making choices about resources and also to the paper called *Selecting Fair and Equitable Learning Materials*. The Saskatchewan Education publication, *Learning Resource Centres in Saskatchewan: A Guide for Development*, provides valuable direction for development of a selection policy. As outlined in the Saskatchewan Education publication, *Indian and Métis Education Policy from Kindergarten to Grade XII*, teachers and teacher-librarians are reminded to select works by and about Indian and Métis peoples.

Videotapes are available for purchase through the duplication services of Media House Productions. Please consult the current Media House Productions catalogue of resources. A copy of this catalogue was sent to every school. Additional copies are for sale from Media House Productions. 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

How to Use the Bibliography

The bibliography is organized in these sections:

Titles and Description: Titles are listed alphabetically. The citations provide bibliographic information, sources, annotations, and suggested use. The abbreviation hdc. denotes hardcover edition, while pbk. indicates paperback edition. ISBN denotes International Standard Book Number, which can usually be used as an order number. An example of a citation for print is shown below.



This Canadian book contains the poems "Wiggle to the Laundromat", "Singa Songa", "The Fishes of Kempenfelt Bay" and "Street Song" which are referred to in the dance curriculum.

Community Resources/Magazines: Lists organizations and magazines which will help in resource based learning.

Musical Compositions Useful for Dance Class: This list of western art and contemporary music was compiled by experienced dance teachers.

Strand/Grade Index: Titles are listed alphabetically under each of the four strands: dance, drama, music and visual art.

Media Index: Titles are listed alphabetically under each media designation.

Distributor Directory: The abbreviations, enclosed in parentheses, following the publisher or producer, represent the distributor. The full names and addresses of these companies are given in this section.

ABC Museum of Fine Arts, Boston (Print-Non-Fiction). Florence Cassen Mayers. Abrams (PRN), 1986. unp. ISBN 0-8109-1847-1 (\$13.95 hdc.)

This ABC book uses works of art from the museum's collection to represent each letter of the alphabet. Beautiful coloured pictures are shown. The size of the book makes it best suited to individual student's use and not for class presentation.

Accentuate the Positive! Expressive Arts for Children with Disabilities (Print-Non-Fiction). Fran Herman and James C. Smith. Jimani Publications (CEM), 1988. 227 p. ISBN 0-9693388-0-5 (\$26.95 pbk.)

This book is an introduction to the use of music, art and drama for students with special needs. Ideas are given on how to adapt the environment of the arts project so that all students can be active participants, not spectators.

This collection of stories written by contemporary Aboriginal authors is interspersed with works of contemporary Aboriginal artists. Short biographies of all contributors are included. Maria Campbell wrote the introduction which deals with the history of the art of storytelling in Aboriginal culture, and the process which led to publication of this anthology. Adventures in Creative Movement Activities (Print-Non-Fiction). Marcia L. Lloyd. National Dance Association (NDA), 1990. 142 p. ISBN 967-914-392-9 (\$19.95 pbk.)

This book is designed for teachers who work with age groups from pre-school through university and wish to use creative movement activities in the classroom, gymnasium or on the playground. These methods and techniques for training students in problem solving and decision making within creative movement activities can also be applied easily to the teaching of other subject matter.

A look at present-day efforts to restore ancient works ravaged by environmental pollution, and at the "masterpieces in the making" of contemporary artists. Highlights include stone sculpting in the Parliament Buildings, Ottawa and a visit to the Taylor Bell Company of England where viewers learn that the harmonics of a bell are designed into its form.

Aïda as told by Leontyne Price (Print-Non-Fiction). Gulliver (CMG), 1990. unpaginated. ISBN 0-15-200405-X (\$19.95 U.S.)

Verdi's story, Dillons' artwork and Price's adaptation work perfectly together to produce a powerful retelling of the tale of star-crossed lovers. Each page of text is faced by a full colour picture which shows in great detail the clothing and decor of Ancient Egypt. A wonderful introduction to this opera story.

All My Relations: Sharing Native Values Through the Arts (Print-Non-Fiction). Catherine Verrall. Canadian Alliance in Solidarity with Native Peoples (CASNP), 1988. 106 p. ISBN 0-921425-02-3 (\$15.00 pbk.)

This book is geared to help nonaboriginal teachers incorporate Aboriginal content into a variety of standard subject areas. It includes a collection of stories, poems, drama games, art activities, songs and a final chapter that deals with symbols often found in Aboriginal literature. The importance of the circle symbol is explained in this book. This information is helpful in teaching the grade five visual art unit on signs and symbols.

Teachers should be aware that the art activities in this book are of an arts and crafts nature and are not necessarily conducive to the aesthetic approach to teaching arts.

All That Glistens (Videotape). (Hand and Eye Series). CBC Enterprises (MHP), n.d. 56 min. Available for duplication from Media House Productions. Order No. V03379

A look at the traditions of great handcrafting in gold, silver, and precious stones still found in Great Britain and Europe. Viewers meet designer Paloma Picasso in Paris and New York. Highlights include a flashback on the breathtaking accomplishments of Faberge and a look at Canadian goldsmith Bill Reid, whose contemporary masterpieces are inspired by Haida Indian traditions.

The children have been working on a mural about their neighbourhood. Jessie, Emma, and Leo discuss how they have used art to show what is important to them. Art uses a painting by Paul Cézanne to explain still life to Leo.

This Canadian book contains the poems "Wiggle to the Laundromat", "Singa Songa", "The Fishes of Kempenfelt Bay" and "Street Song" which are referred to in the dance strand of the curriculum.

Alphonse Knows the Colour of Spring (Print-Fiction). H. Werner Zimmerman. Oxford University Press (OUP), 1990. unpaginated. ISBN 0-19-540743-1 (\$9.95 hdc.)

To celebrate the first day of spring, Alphonse decides to paint eggs. Because of severe clumsiness, the paints get mixed. A humorous introduction to colour theory.

Amahl and the Night Visitors (Print-Fiction). Gian Carlo Menotti. William Morrow (MCM), 1986. 64 p. ISBN 0-688-05426-9 (\$15.95 hdc.)

This storybook simply retells Menotti's opera of the travels of the three wisemen. Michele Lemieux's illustrations enhance the story. An effective way to introduce opera.

America, I Hear You (Print-Non-Fiction). Barbara Mitchell. Carolrhoda (GEA), 1987. 56 p. ISBN 0-87614-309-5 (\$13.50 hdc.)

George Gershwin is given credit for making jazz "respectable" by fusing this style with symphonic music. This short book tells his life story.

Ancient Civilizations - The Story of the Stele (Print-Non-Fiction). M.R. Burke and C.L. Malczewski. (Social Studies Through Drama Series). Learning Through Drama (LTD), 1988. 18 p. (\$9.00 pbk.)

This sequence of lessons examines the importance of a nation's culture to its people through its statuary. The four lessons give detailed information to help the teacher facilitate the drama. It

serves as a clear model unit for teachers new to the drama in context approach. Originally designed for grade six and seven students, but with minor modifications is useful for other grades.

Each year the Bologna International Children's Book Fair sponsors a juried illustrators' exhibition and publishes a catalog of the works presented. It includes works by book illustrators from all over the world. This work is an excellent source of quality visuals for use in the visual art strand.

This useful teacher resource focuses more on the philosophy of art education than on teaching techniques. Includes an excellent section on the artistic development of a child from preschool to grade nine.

Architecture (Print-Non-Fiction). Eleanor Van Zandt. Wayland (NEL), 1989. 48 p. ISBN 1-85210-346-9 (\$24.95 hdc.)

This British book deals with architecture of the past and present from different parts of the world. It gives introductory instructions on how to analyze architecture.

Provides a brief historical overview of the Arctic in order to lay the foundation for a better understanding of the people who have lived in the barren lands for thousands of years. As the development of culture in the Arctic is traced, one realizes that art forms are always closely related to the environment in which the artist lives. The advent of the Europeans on the Arctic scene affects both the environment and the art of the Inuit.

This series offers the classroom teacher as well as the art specialist a program that integrates "seeing art" activities with "making art" activities.

Each kit is composed of:

- a large corrugated plastic carrying case;
- 27 to 33 full-colour art prints showing a wide selection of two-dimensional and three-dimensional works from various cultures, 40% of which are Canadian. Prints are 42 cm x 62 cm, laminated;
- a teacher's manual for each grade containing suggestions for questioning and discussion strategies as well as biographical information about the artists.

Some of the written text and chosen pieces of art show a lack of understanding of the Indian and Métis cultures. The works should be viewed as historical, not current depictions of Indian and Métis lifestyles.

This attractive series deals with four areas of art education: aesthetic perception, creative expression, art heritage and aesthetic valuing. It develops cross-curricular lessons and special attention is given to developing thinking skills through art activities.

The high quality colour reproductions of artworks from a wide span of time are accompanied by a comprehensive teacher's manual. The manual includes overviews of each work with biographical information on the artist, questions to help focus on the artwork and activities to extend the study of the work. Prints are connected to certain lessons in specific grades but can be used independently of written instructions. The concluding section of the manual is a thematic approach to the artworks included (e.g. Artists Portray People) which uses an average of six prints that have something in common. Written information regarding Aboriginal art often contains unacceptable vocabulary and attitudes (eg. Eskimo rather than Inuit).

Enough examples are shown to clarify the concepts. The section on environment strives to increase visual awareness of all facets of one's surroundings. The final section provides a brief overview of art history.

Without forfeiting creativity, this binder sets out lessons which concentrate on awareness raising and skills development. The 206 lessons (spanning preschool to grade seven level) are each outlined on a single sheet of paper. Concepts, objectives and evaluation techniques for each lesson are clearly presented. Suggestions for viewing activities as well as hands-on activities are included.

The eight very short chapters of this book tell how a neighbourly artist teaches a young boy how to draw. It explains how an artist works and stresses the importance of close observation. Beautiful pencil drawings reinforce the message of the book.

This book does an excellent job of blending the old and new art work of the Wood Cree or Nehiyawak. The traditional art forms featured are basketry, decorated tools, quillwork, moose hair tufting, fish scale embroidery, bead work, carving and bark biting. Instructions are given for projects to be done in the style of these crafts. The works of 28 contemporary Aboriginal artists are shown.

Artists highlighted are: Norval Morrisseau, Farron Callihoo, Morris Cardinal and Alex Janvier. The informative text is written in an easy-to-read story form.

The 28 minute video shows excerpts of a drama in which a multi-graded class, students in grade one to five and their teacher, work together. It focuses on the range of ways that the teacher functions throughout the drama, highlights the students' work and attempts to capture the spirit of their drama. It also includes interview segments in which the teacher provides direct links between the drama unfolding on the video and the processes and strategies described in the curriculum. This videotape gives an overview of the dance strand in the Saskatchewan Elementary Arts Education Curriculum. Two classes, a grade three class and a grade five and six class, are profiled. The 29 minute videotape shows excerpts from each class's dance unit. It highlights the range of activities and teaching strategies that are part of the dance curriculum. The video focuses on the teaching of creative dance and shows how the three components (creative/productive, cultural/historical and critical/responsive) are included in a dance unit. This kit consists of an audiocassette and a 20 page guide. The cassette includes 15 short instrumental musical selections. Most are works by well known composers. For ease of use in a classroom setting each is recorded twice on the tape. The printed guide includes doodle-like marks to provide a music visualization. One section called action emphasis lists action words to help direct the dance (i.e. jump-travel-jump). These are specific but not restrictive. The guide also pinpoints the dynamic emphasis, relationship emphasis, spatial emphasis and images and ideas relevant to the dance. Three of the dances are choreographed in great detail; others are not so strictly outlined. This tape is a good introduction for teachers and students who require some information on how to make dances. It would provide background necessary to go on to create one's own dances.

Writing Steps Down, Watching A Ballet). Useful organization makes it ideal for quick reference.

A good historical piece on the development of dance in Canada. *On the Spot* is an interview with Fred Davis of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet. Davis tells the story of the ballet as it is shown in rehearsal. The training of ballet dancers is explained and special attention is given to the qualities needed in male dancers. All dancers in the troupe are introduced including Arnold Spohr of Saskatchewan.

The characters in this video discover how artists collect interesting subjects for their work. A trip to the zoo and two artists' studios are part of their research.

Various media are introduced in this sequence. The children visit a totem pole carver, a glass blower and a painter. They realize the variety of effects that can be achieved in utilizing the materials.

Groupwork is used in an art project. The team solves the problem by defining the problem, brainstorming possible solutions, testing solutions, dividing tasks and completing the project.

Program 6, Order No. V3539 - *Lines, Shapes, Colours and Textures*

The elements of design are introduced to the children and they explore how the elements can work together to create moods and feelings.

Program 7, Order No. V3540 - *Putting it Together*

The principles of composition in art (balance, repetition/variety and focal point) are explained to the children in this program. The concepts are reinforced by having the students act them out.

Program 8, Order No. V3541 - *What Does It Mean?*

Students learn that interpretation of an artwork can be influenced by historical and cultural knowledge of the piece. During a trip to a museum they apply their knowledge of the elements of design and principles of composition.

The children in this program are encouraged to form opinions of artworks based on these criteria: Is it well made? Is it well designed? Is it unique? They use this process in viewing art gallery works and then apply the evaluation techniques to their own work.

Professional artists show the students how they can express ideas and feelings in new ways by using computer generated art, using ordinary materials in new ways and looking at the subject in new ways. Students are encouraged to use these new techniques.
